1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE AND SUBSTITUTIONS

There were no apologies for absence or substitutions on this occasion.

2. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

The minutes of the meeting of the Sub-Committee held on 6 September 2016 were approved as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

3. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were no declarations of interest.

**4. REPORT OF CORPORATE DIRECTOR (OPERATIONAL SERVICES) - A.1 -
APPLICATION FOR THE VARIATION OF A PREMISES LICENCE - THE MANOR,
RECTORY ROAD, GREAT HOLLAND, ESSEX**

The Chairman (Councillor V E Guglielmi) welcomed everyone to the meeting.

The Council's Licensing Officer (Emma King) then gave a verbal summary of the written report and advised that the Sub-Committee had before it, for its consideration, as set out in item A.1 of the Report of the Corporate Director (Operational Services), an application for the Variation of the Premises Licence held by Olivia Hearn ("the applicant") for The Manor Public House, Rectory Road, Great Holland.

Section 2.2 of the written report set out the proposed opening hours for the premises whilst Sections 3.1 to 3.6 inclusive detailed the current licensable activities. The proposed licensable activities applied for by the applicant were before Members in Sections 4.1 to 4.6 of the written report. However, it was noted that variation in respect of Late Night Refreshment, at 4.5, was not being sought at this time, as this had not been included in the original advertising and the applicants did not want to delay the application as a whole.

The applicant had stated the steps that she proposed to take to promote the statutory Licensing Objectives within her Operating Schedule and these were detailed in Sections 5.1 to 5.5 inclusive. The applicants had also offered to stop outside events at 10.00 pm.

All responsible authorities had been consulted with as standard procedure and it had been confirmed that Essex Police had spoken with the applicant on 18 July 2017. The applicant had confirmed that the outside mobile bar would only be used seasonally and would be hired out to private parties off site. The applicant had also confirmed that the outdoor alcohol would be served in plastic glasses only. Essex Police therefore had no objections to this application.

The Council's Pollution and Environmental Control team had objected to the application and Andy Rutson-Edwards (Environmental Protection Officer – Pollution & Environmental Control Team) had submitted the following comments regarding the premises licence variation:

"I ask that the variation, if granted restricts all outdoor events referred to in Part 4 of the application to finish no later than 23.00 with the speakers positioned so that the sound is directed inward away from noise sensitive premises.

My previous paragraph refers to the playing of live music, recorded music and anything similar (sections E, F, and H) in the application where it relates to outdoor events these are further restricted by the condition as follows:

Not to continue beyond 23.00. Maximum noise levels (MNL) LAeq(15min) from the events shall not exceed 65dB(A) 1 metre from the nearest noise sensitive property.

For a licence variation, if given for music after 23.00 including outdoor events please take note of the following: Directions, given under the Noise Act 1996 provide that the permitted level for the purposes of that Act is 34 decibels where the underlying noise level does not exceed 24 decibels or 10 decibels above underlying noise levels in any other case. In the event that the representations are received and the Authority concludes that a noise condition is required that starting point for such a condition would be 34 decibels.

Adding these conditions to any variation of license will significantly reduce the likelihood of public and statutory nuisance.

If an applicant wishes to contend that higher or longer hours are appropriate then the Authority would expect the applicant to provide a noise survey to support such a contention.

Alternatively the following condition would achieve the same effect if imposed restricting the end time of outdoor recorded and live music events to 23.00. A noise limiter must be fitted to the musical amplification system set a level determined by, and to the satisfaction of, an authorised officer of the Environmental Service, so as to ensure that no noise nuisance is caused to local residents. The operational panel of the noise limiter shall then be secured by key or password to the satisfaction of officers from the Environmental Service and access shall only be by persons authorised by the Premises Licence Holder.

The limiter shall not be altered without prior agreement with the Environmental Service. No alteration or modification to any existing sound system(s) should be effected without prior knowledge of an authorised Officer of the Environmental Service. No additional

sound generating equipment shall be used on the premises without being routed through the sound limiter device."

No other representations had been received by any individual, body or business that had grounds to do so.

The Sub-Committee had before it for its information the relevant extract from the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy in respect of the statutory 'Prevention of Public Nuisance' Licensing Objective.

Members also had before them for their assistance the relevant paragraphs from the Home Office's Section 182 Guidance that accompanied the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of the following –

- (1) Prevention of Public Nuisance;
- (2) Prevention of Crime and Disorder; and
- (3) Hours of Trading.

The Chairman asked if anyone had any questions that they would like to ask the Licensing Officer following her summary of the written report. There were no questions asked.

Mrs Hearn's husband was also present and he confirmed that he and his wife were business partners, however Mrs Hearn was the Premises Licence holder for The Manor.

Mr and Mrs Hearn addressed the Sub-Committee and put forward their case as to why the application should be approved and confirmed that the opening hours chosen for the proposed usage of the outside area had been requested as it was in line with the opening hours for the current licensed area. They then responded to questions raised by Members.

In response to being asked about car parking space Mr and Mrs Hearn confirmed that the car park would still be used for parking but that they were hoping to buy some additional land in the future and in the future they were considering changing around the car parking area and garden. When outdoor events were arranged, the mobile bar known as "the rocket" would be parked in the car park, and that was why the application included the car park as well as the garden but the rest of the car park would still be used for parking. In response to being asked when they planned for events to take place they confirmed that they would look to hold events on bank holiday weekends, village fete days and on the anniversary for each year since they had opened the pub.

Mr and Mrs Hearn said that they had taken a year to renovate the public house before opening and that the application had initially been made on the basis of the times that had been permitted prior to their ownership. They called last orders at 11.00 pm. They wanted to be a "family friendly" pub and were conscious of noise issues as they lived on the premises and had a two year old child. They understood the concerns of the Council's Pollution and Environmental Control Team about noise and were happy to agree a 10.00 pm finish time for outdoor events, but if someone particularly wanted something different they could apply for a Temporary Event Notice (TEN).

Mr and Mrs Hearn confirmed that they would manage the noise levels outdoors, including where people brought their own noise equipment, by physically walking around at regular intervals.

Mr Rutson-Edwards then addressed the Sub-Committee and explained why the Council's Pollution and Environmental Control Team had put forward representations on this application and their suggested control measures. He then responded to questions raised by Members which included queries about Noise Limiters.

The Chairman then requested Mr and Mrs Hearn and Mr Rutson-Edwards to leave the meeting to discuss the suggested control measures in more detail. Mr and Mrs Hearn and Mr Rutson-Edwards then withdrew from the meeting.

Following that discussion Mr and Mrs Hearn and Mr Rutson-Edwards then returned to the meeting indicating that they had reached agreement on measures to control the noise at events held outdoors; Members were given the opportunity to ask any further questions.

In response to being asked if the Public House was a Freehouse Mr and Mrs Hearn confirmed that it was; in response to being asked if they had any help and support, they confirmed that they had lots of help and support from their respective families and that Mr Hearn's family had experience in the industry.

The Sub-Committee, the Council's Solicitor, Legal Administration and Information Officer and the Committee Services Officer then withdrew from the meeting in order for the Sub-Committee to consider the application and reach a decision.

The Sub-Committee, the Council's Solicitor, the Legal Administration and Information Officer and the Committee Services Officer then returned to the meeting.

The Chairman of the Sub-Committee then read out the following decision:

The Sub-Committee has given careful consideration to this application. In reaching our decision, we have taken into account the views expressed by the applicant, the representations received from Tendring District Council Environmental Services along with the guidance issued by the Secretary of State and other matters set out in the Licensing Authority's own Statement of Licensing Policy.

The decision of the Sub-Committee is to **GRANT** this application in full, subject to the imposition of certain conditions.

In addition to any mandatory conditions and any conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule the following conditions will apply in order to satisfy the relevant Licensing Objective.

That in relation to the application generally the applicant now seeks a finish time for all outdoor events of 10.00 pm, and the licence is granted to allow that with one condition added, namely that for all outdoor events a noise limiter and/or some way of managing the noise so that the levels noted by the Council's Pollution and Environmental Control Team are not exceeded. This condition has been agreed between the parties and is made in respect of the Licensing Objective for the Prevention of Public Nuisance.

Finally, I must mention that all parties who are aggrieved at the decision of the Sub-Committee have the right of appeal to the Magistrates' Court.

This decision was made today, 14 August 2017 and will be confirmed in writing to all parties.

6. MINUTES OF THE LAST MEETING

The minutes of the last meeting of the Sub-Committee, held on 15 May 2017, were approved as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

7. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

There were none.

**8. REPORT OF CORPORATE DIRECTOR (OPERATIONAL SERVICES) - A.1 -
APPLICATION FOR THE REVIEW OF A PREMISES LICENCE - NIRALA TANDOORI,
14 BROOK STREET, MANNINGTREE, CO11 1DR**

The Chairman (Councillor Cossens) welcomed everyone to the meeting and gave an overview of the procedure that would be followed for the hearing. It was confirmed that Members and Interested Parties had received the 'Procedures for Hearings – Premises/Personal Licences Sub-Committee procedure' document.

The Council's Licensing Assistant (Emma King) then gave a verbal summary of the Report of the Corporate Director (Operational Services) (A.1) and advised that the Sub-Committee had before it, for its consideration, an application for the Review of the Premises Licence held by Ms Tahrima Ahmed for the Nirala Tandoori, 14 Brook Street, Manningtree.

Members were informed by the Licensing Assistant as part of her summary that an application for the review of the Premises Licence for the Nirala Tandoori had been submitted by Essex Police following investigations by Officers of the East of England Immigration Enforcement Team at the Premises and that this had been received by the Licensing Authority on 11 October 2017. The application for the Review had been

submitted on the grounds that the Licensing Objective in respect of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder had been breached because the Premises Licence Holder Ms Tahrima Ahmed and the Designated Premises Supervisor Mr Khaled Ahmed had been found to be employing persons who had no right to work or stay in the United Kingdom. As a result of that breach, Essex Police were requesting the Sub-Committee to revoke the premises licence in question.

It was reported that the review application and its accompanying supporting documents had advised and contained the following:

- A Section 9 witness statement from a Detective Constable Mr Richard Adams which had detailed an authorised visit made with HM Revenues and Customs on 30 August 2017 to the Nirala Tandoori, where during the visit it was suspected that at least two of the persons present were suspected illegal immigrants. Detective Constable Adams had subsequently made a referral to UK Immigration regarding the visit and the potential illegal immigrants working there;
- A Section 9 witness statement from Immigration Officer John Donaldson which had detailed a visit to the Nirala Tandoori on 14 September 2017, where during the visit he had questioned Mr Nizam Uddin;
- A Section 9 witness statement from Immigration Officer James Denham which had detailed a visit to the Nirala Tandoori on 14 September 2017, where during the visit he had questioned Mr Abdur Rahim;
- A Section 9 witness statement from Chief Immigration Officer Jack Davis which had detailed a visit to the Nirala Tandoori on 14 September 2017, where during the visit it was found that Mr Uddin had no permission to work and he was subsequently escorted from the premises and where it was found that Mr Rahim had no Visa to remain or work in the UK and he was therefore arrested;
- A Section 9 witness statement from Police Licensing Officer Alan Beckett which had detailed a visit to the Nirala Tandoori on 30 September 2017 where the visit from the Immigration Service had been discussed and the DPS had been asked to show passport checks;
- A Section 9 witness statement from Special Constable Jack Howe which had detailed a visit to Nirala Tandoori on 30 September 2017 where evidence of right to work documents had been requested;
- Result of Home Office right to work for Mr Nizam Uddin;
- Result of Home Office right to work for Mr Abdur Rahim;
- A transcript of a stated and certified case in the Queens Bench Division (Administrative Court) High Court of Justice which had been heard on 14 April 2016 and had detailed a successful appeal made by East Lindsey District Council against a District Judge's decision of 23 June 2015 not to uphold a revocation of a premises licence determined by a Licensing Sub-Committee of East Lindsey District Council on grounds of crime and disorder because the licence holder had knowingly employed a person who did not have the right to

work in the United Kingdom and as a result, this had breached the Prevention of the Crime and Disorder licensing objective required under the Licensing Act 2003. This case clarified the position that there did not need to be a prosecution or criminal conviction in relation to a licence holder for a Licensing Authority's crime prevention objective to be engaged although each case would be decided upon its own merits.. The promotion of the prevention of crime and disorder by a Licensing Authority was anticipatory and preventive.

- A schedule of Income Tax (Pay As You Earn) Regulations 2003; and
- A schedule of desired outcomes that Essex Police were seeking from this hearing as a result of having applied to the Licensing Authority for a Review of the Premises Licence held by Ms Tahrima Ahmed for the Nirala Tandoori, 14 Brook Street, Manningtree. This was the revocation of the Premises Licence as Essex Police did not consider that it was suitable to impose conditions onto the Premises Licence in a case where workers had been employed illegally.

A copy of the Premises Licence Review application and all of the documents referred to in the bullet points above were attached to the report as Appendix 2.

It was also reported that notice of the review application had been made and advertised in accordance with Section 51 of the Licensing Act 2003 and the regulations that accompanied it. In particular, a notice detailing the review application had been clearly displayed on the premises concerned and on Tendring District Council's Website for the prescribed 28 day period. Periodic checks had been undertaken by the Licensing Authority to ensure that this was the case. The end of the notice period had been 8 November 2017.

The Licensing Authority had accepted the review application and had been satisfied that it had been properly served. It was satisfied that the application and the representations that it made were relevant to the licensing objectives and were not vexatious, repetitious or frivolous in nature.

It was confirmed that no representations had been received from any other Responsible Authorities or other persons who could also make statutory representations in regards to review applications.

Members were informed that any such representations should be relevant and not be considered by the Licensing Authority as vexatious, repetitious or frivolous and could be made in opposition to, or support of, an application and could be made by any individual, body or business that had grounds to do so. The Statutory Guidance was silent on whether representations could be made against an application for a review, or in support of the respondent to the review (which in this case was the Premises Licence holder (Ms Tahrima Ahmed)). However, given that the Guidance was silent on this question, but clearly indicated that other persons could make representations in regards to a review and that representations could be made in support of applications, it was therefore reasonable to assume that representations could also be made in support of the Premises Licence Holder (Ms Tahrima Ahmed in this matter) for due consideration by the Licensing Sub-Committee as part of the Review application hearing process.

The Sub-Committee was informed that Sections 11.1 to 11.28 of the Guidance [issued by the Secretary of State under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003] assisted all parties in respect to advice on review applications and hearings, including those arising in connection with crime and the relevant extracts of this Guidance were attached as Appendix 3.

The Licensing Assistant then informed the Committee that they had received a No Action Notice issued by Immigration Enforcement from Ms Tahrira Ahmed that morning which stated that Ms Tahrira Ahmed would not be liable for a civil penalty in respect of suspected breaches of Section 15 of the Immigration, Asylum and Nationality Act 2006. A copy of this was provided to the Committee and the representatives of Essex Police.

The Chairman asked if anyone had any questions that they would like to ask the Licensing Assistant following her summary. There were no questions asked.

Joanna Stainsbury, the County Licensing Officer for Essex Police (who had submitted the application on behalf of Essex Police for the review of the Premises Licence held by Ms Tahrira Ahmed) then addressed the Sub-Committee and gave an overview of the events and facts of the case and the reasons behind why Essex Police had made such an application.

It was stated by Ms Stainsbury that from the evidence it could be seen how easy it was for an employer to make checks. Not making the required checks affected other businesses and exploited labour, denied the payment of tax and national insurance and was considered modern day slavery. Employees often worked long hours and did not receive the minimum wage.

She further stated that if there were no records of employees then it was difficult to prove that there were persons working illegally at the premises.

The Chairman then asked questions and queried the dates of the visit by the Police as on page 32 of the Agenda, the Police report stated 17th September 2017 whereas on page 25 it was stated to be 14th September 2017. The Police confirmed that it was in fact 14th September 2017. The Chairman also queried the reference to Mr Rahim's claim for asylum which appeared to have been made on 18 September 2017 and not as soon as he entered the country; the Immigration Officer said that the claim for asylum usually happened once the person had been arrested.

The Chairman then asked if any Members had any further questions or whether the applicant or the licence holder had any questions that they wished to ask of each other or any other party relevant to the review hearing.

Mr Hasan, a Registered Foreign Lawyer at Universal Solicitors (legal representative), for Mr Ahmed had no questions, but he had been provided with a Witness Statement from Mr Ahmed and asked whether this could be considered today. The Committee, noting that the agreement of the other parties to the review would need to be given before evidence being submitted at such a late stage could be considered, agreed that the parties should be supplied with copies in order that consideration could be given as to whether the evidence could be accepted or not and asked for copies to be provided to the Committee and the Police. A short adjournment was agreed in order that the copies could be taken, and the Committee and the Police could read this statement. A room

was made available for the police and the Immigration Officer to consider this evidence privately.

Following the adjournment the meeting reconvened and the Chairman asked the Police whether they were happy to accept the statement and they confirmed that they were.

The Chairman then asked whether Mr Ahmed would be able to read the Statement out and answer questions. He confirmed that he could and proceeded to read out his Statement.

In summary, Mr Ahmed stated that:-

- He positively promoted all licensing objectives as per the Licensing Act 2003 and he said that he did not breach the Licence conditions.
- That he was responsible for recruiting employees for the restaurant.
- This was his only job which provided for himself and his family.
- He confirmed the visit of the Immigration Officers on 14th September 2017, that this was their first visit, and that he was present throughout the visit. He stated that he was present during the full conversation between the Immigration Officer and Mr Uddin and Mr Rahim, and that the two men were at the restaurant to meet a friend, and that he did not know them.
- He was very aware of his responsibilities as a Designated Premises Supervisor and that he had to make sure that employees are allowed to work legally in the United Kingdom and of the need to see original documentation.
- He stated that he carried out right to work checks via the www.gov.uk website and that if the employees provided a British passport then he did not need to carry out further checks.
- He stated that the business had been struggling financially and that if the premises loses its licence he would have to shut the business.

Mr Ahmed explained that he had spoken to the Police and Licensing Officers to explain his situation. He stated that if the Licence was revoked he would have no option but to close the restaurant.

Mr Hasan, Mr Ahmed's legal representative, said that Mr Ahmed denied that Mr Rahim and Mr Uddin had ever worked at, or been employed by him at the restaurant. He said that Mr Ahmed had provided information to Immigration Enforcement and that subsequently they had provided the Premises Licence holder, Ms Tahrma Ahmed, with the No Action Notice. Mr Hasan referred to a previous Premises/Personal Licences Sub-Committee meeting where the Saffron Restaurant had had their licence reviewed because of illegal workers and had received a three month suspension of their licence. He stated that Mr Ahmed had no case to answer as here neither Mr Rahim or Mr Uddin had ever worked at the Nirala Tandoori Restaurant and that therefore he should be allowed to continue with his business, and the police case should be dismissed.

The Chairman then proceeded to ask questions of Mr Ahmed and queried paragraph 13 of his statement whereby he stated that Mr Uddin and Mr Rahim had come to the restaurant to meet their friend, but that page 49 of the Agenda in the Witness Statement of John Donaldson, Immigration Officer stated that Mr Rahim had been encountered in the kitchen preparing food, dressed in chef's white jacket and an apron. Mr Ahmed was asked to explain the difference between not knowing the man and him being in the kitchen, apparently working. Mr Ahmed stated that when he came into the restaurant, after changing upstairs, everyone was sitting at a table when he arrived and he did not see the Immigration Officer arriving. Mr Ahmed stated that he did not know Mr Rahim and did not know why he was in the kitchen.

Mr Ahmed was then asked about paragraphs 18-21 in his statement regarding the checks he undertook on prospective employees of their right to work in this Country. He was asked whether he had any paperwork to prove that the checks had been undertaken. He stated that he had some in his car, but that they were checks on prospective employees that held British passports and once they had shown him a British passport he did not need to undertake any further checks. The Chairman noted that it might have been useful for the Committee to see that paperwork.

Cllr J Henderson then questioned Mr Ahmed and stated that on the paperwork it said he had been the Designated Premises Supervisor since 2011 and asked when he had started doing "right to work" checks. Mr Ahmed stated that if a British passport was provided then no further checks were needed. In respect of point 12 of Mr Ahmed's Statement, he stated that he did not know anything about Mr Uddin or Mr Rahim and was just meeting them for the first time. Point 16 of Mr Ahmed's statement was in conflict in that he said that he had provided all the information that he knew about these two gentlemen but then had claimed that he did not know them and that they were only visiting someone in the kitchen.

Ms Stainsbury, Essex Police County Licensing Officer, spoke about District Licensing Officer Beckett's visit on 30th September when he asked to see the paperwork for the right to work checks undertaken and Mr Ahmed stated that he had not started it yet. He said that the visit took place on a Saturday which was a busy day at the restaurant. When Mr Ahmed saw Mr Beckett's statement, he telephoned him as he was not happy with his statement. Mr Ahmed claimed that Mr Beckett had told him that he would get a chance to explain at the Sub-Committee meeting. Mr Ahmed said that it was very hard, that so many people arrived looking for jobs but they did not all have paperwork so he could not employ them.

Gordon Ashford, Essex Police then asked Mr Ahmed who was working on the 2 days that he said he was off sick, prior to the visit by the Police on 14th September 2017. Mr Ahmed said that a Mr Abdul Islam should be cooking. Mr Ahmed was asked who did he expect to be cooking on the day the Immigration Officers came. Mr Ashford said that Mr Rahim was seen cooking, dressed in a Chef's white jacket and told the Officers that he was on trial as a chef. Mr Ahmed said that there was no way anyone unknown could work in the kitchen and to his knowledge Mr Rahim had not been working. Mr Ahmed was asked whether his business was struggling and he confirmed that it was. He said that it was difficult to employ people, there were staff shortages and he was working 7 days a week. Mr Ahmed said that he had had a heart bypass operation and he did not need pressure; he said the restaurant was in a small town and he had a number of regular customers and they had had a little bit of success there. Mr Ahmed said that it

was only British passport holders he did not need to check. He was then asked whether he knew what the minimum wage was and he replied £7.50. Mr Ashford said that one of those persons was seen in the restaurant in August 2017 and checks were then conducted regarding those persons and which was why Immigration had returned in September 2017.

The Chairman then asked the Police to summarise their case and they confirmed that it was essentially about illegal workers and facilitating illegal working. There were people who worked for board and lodging or below the minimum wage, which could aid struggling businesses, and Mr Ahmed had told the Committee that the business was struggling. He referred to paragraph 11.23 of the Guidance at Appendix 3 whereby financial hardship should not be a consideration to revoking the licence if premises were employing illegal workers. Other Indian restaurants operated successfully without an alcohol licence.

Mr Hasan, Mr Ahmed's legal representative then summarised his case and stated that no immigration status checks needed to be undertaken if British passports were provided. The only check that needed to be undertaken was whether the passport was valid or not. This case was in respect of persons he did not know, that so he did not need to undertake any checks.

The Police asked if Mr Ahmed believed that if someone came for training or a trial that there was no duty to undertake any right to work checks.

Mr Hasan stated again that Mr Ahmed did not know Mr Uddin and Mr Rahim, and that the outcome of the No Action Notice meant that there was no case to answer. He said that he upheld all of the Licensing Objectives. Mr Hasan asked that Mr Ahmed be allowed to continue with the Premises Licence and with no restrictions added.

The Sub-Committee then withdrew from the meeting in order for the Sub-Committee to consider the application and reach a decision. They asked the the Council's Solicitor and the Legal Administration and Information Officer to leave with them. The Sub-Committee, Council's Solicitor and Legal Administration and Information Officer then returned to the meeting and the Council's Solicitor confirmed that she had not provided any specific legal advice to the Sub-Committee whilst it was making its decision.

The Chairman of the Sub-Committee then read out the following decision:

"The Sub-Committee has given careful consideration to this application for a review and to the actual representations received from Essex Police on the grounds that the Licensing Objective in respect of the Prevention of Crime and Disorder had been breached for the reasons set out in their representations. In making their decision, the Sub-Committee have taken into account:-

- (i) relevant matters set out in the Licensing Authority's own Statement of Licensing Policy;
- (ii) the relevant parts of the Guidance issued by the Secretary of State;
- (iii) the range of powers provided to Licensing Authorities by the Licensing Act 2003 in determining a Review;
- (iv) Any legal advice given by the Council's Solicitor.

The Sub-Committee are also aware that it must act to promote the Licensing Objectives as set out in the Licensing Act 2003 and that any decision it took in determining a Review must be necessary for the promotion of these objectives.

The decision of the Sub-Committee is as follows:-

1. In respect of an application for the Review of a Premises Licence submitted by Essex Police in respect of the premises known as Nirala Tandoori, 14 Brook Street, Manningtree the Sub-Committee's decision is to revoke the licence.
2. It has been determined that the Licence must be revoked for the following reasons:- For the prevention of crime and disorder.
3. Reviews of premises' licences follow where there are concerns that some aspect of the business or its behaviour affects that licence. Where the activity causing concern is so serious, involving criminal activity such as the employment, or possible employment of a person or persons who are disqualified from working because of their immigration status, then a review can be sought without previous involvement of the applicant, here Essex Police.
4. The Sub-Committee's role is to promote the four licensing objectives – here the prevention of crime and disorder – and not to punish, that is the role of others. That said, the Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 does suggest that in certain cases, where the premises have been used to further crime, then revocation should be seriously considered, even for the first incident.
5. Mr Khaled Ahmed has been the Designated Premises Supervisor since 4 May 2011, and his daughter, Ms Tahrima Ahmed has been the Premises Licence Holder since 6 January 2017 of the NIRALA Tandoori Restaurant at 14 Brook Street, Manningtree.
6. We are told that on 30 August 2017 officers from the Police and Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs visited the Nirala Tandoori. On that occasion several members of staff were found at the premises, one of whom disappeared before he could be spoken to, whilst others were vague in their answers, or were unable to produce any identification. A referral was made to the Immigration Service.
7. On 14 September 2017 officers from the Immigration Service attended the Nirala Tandoori where they found 4 men in the kitchen, apparently undertaking various tasks, and a fifth man preparing food in a room next to the kitchen.
8. One of the men in the kitchen, who was dressed in a white chef's jacket and apron, which he removed upon the entry of the officers, was ABDUR RAHIM. It transpired that Mr Rahim had no right to work in the UK. Subsequently, on 18 September 2017, Mr Rahim made a claim for asylum.

-
9. A second male, NIZAM UDDIN, was found in the restaurant: he was wearing black trousers and a pink shirt. It is not clear whether he was working or not; what is clear is that Mr Uddin has no right to work in the UK.
 10. In this case we have been told that no civil penalties have been imposed in respect of either Mr Rahim or Mr Uddin by Immigration Enforcement. Mr Jack Davis, a Chief Immigration Officer, has explained that this decision would have been made by a central office in Manchester, and such decisions are made purely on the basis of the evidence in front of that office at the time, including anything the alleged employer might have said or documents produced by them, and whether or not that evidence reaches the standard of proof, which in such cases we are told is the civil standard i.e. the balance of probabilities.
 11. We have been told that the employment of workers who have no right to work in the UK raises a number of issues, including the possibility for example that they are being paid below the minimum wage, are expected to work long hours, and that tax may not be paid, or paid at the correct rate. The Police have also stated that somebody may not be paid simply in money but that board and lodgings may also constitute payment.
 12. Mr Ahmed has presented the Sub-Committee today with a written proof of evidence, which he then proceeded to read to the Sub-Committee. As part of what Mr Ahmed told the Sub-Committee he said that he understood, and complied with, the requirements for checking the rights of people to work in the UK and although he told the Sub-Committee that he had been undertaking checks, including copying passports, he was unable to produce anything to the Sub-Committee today but said it was "in his car". He also said that the only people he employed were British and having seen their passports, no further checks were necessary.
 13. Mr Ahmed also said that he did not know either Mr Rahim or Mr Uddin, and that on 14 September 2017 he had arrived at the restaurant from his home in Enfield, had changed into his working clothes upstairs and when he came downstairs he found people sitting around talking to the Immigration Officers.
 14. We have also heard from Mr Ahmed's solicitor, Mr HASAN who has reiterated that Mr Ahmed does not know Mr Abdur Rahim or Mr Nizam Uddin; that where training or trial employment is being undertaken checks may not be necessary; and that no civil penalties have been imposed upon Mr Ahmed and the Nirala Tandoori Restaurant.
 15. We are concerned that despite a visit to the Nirala Tandoori on 30 August, and a subsequent visit on 14 September 2017 by Immigration Officers, no documentation was produced to the Sub-Committee today to prove that checks, of any employee, had been undertaken.
 16. We view this matter seriously and for the reasons given above, and with some regret, have decided to revoke the Premises Licence for the Nirala Tandoori Restaurant. We note that other similar restaurants remain in business without

a Premises Licence, and we hope that this will be true for the Nirala Tandoori Restaurant.

Details of the Sub-Committee's decision will be notified to all interested parties in writing.

Finally, I must mention that all parties who are aggrieved at the decision of the Sub-Committee have a right of appeal to the Magistrates' Court.

The meeting was declared closed at 4.53 p.m.

REPORT OF CORPORATE DIRECTOR [OPERATIONAL SERVICES]

LICENSING ACT 2003

Members are respectfully reminded that, in determining the matters listed under item A.1, they are exercising an administrative function but should determine each matter adopting the civil burden of proof, i.e. 'on the balance of probabilities'. The matters will be determined on the facts before the Sub-Committee and the rules of natural justice will apply. Each application must be considered in its own right and on its own merits.

Premises Licence Applications

The Licensing Act 2003 established a single integrated scheme for licensing premises that are used for the supply of alcohol, regulated entertainment or provision of late night refreshment. This system of licensing incorporates the sale of alcohol both on and off licensed premises; public entertainment such as music, dancing, indoor sporting events, boxing or wrestling, theatres, cinemas; and late night refreshment houses and take-aways.

The purpose of the licensing system is to positively promote the four 'licensing objectives'.

These are:

- The Prevention of Crime and Disorder
- The Prevention of Public Nuisance
- Public Safety
- The Protection of Children from Harm.

The options open to the Sub-Committee when considering this application are:

1. To grant the application for a premises licence subject to such conditions that are consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application and any mandatory conditions applicable.
2. To grant the application for the premises licence subject to such conditions as are consistent with the operating schedule accompanying the application and which are modified to such an extent as the Sub Committee considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and any mandatory conditions applicable.
3. To grant the licence as above, but to exclude from the scope of the premises licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates.
4. To reject the application

When determining the application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives in the overall interests of the local community the Licensing Authority in the form of the Licensing Sub-Committee must have regard and give appropriate weight to the following:

- Full Hearing Procedure for Applications for Premises Licences/Club Premises Certificates where representations have been received.
- Tendring District Council's Statement of Licensing Policy.
- The Statutory Guidance issued by the Secretary of State under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- The steps appropriate to positively promote the four 'Licensing Objectives'.
- Representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties.

Human Rights Implications

A Licence is to be regarded as the property of the applicant; however their right to the use of the property must be balanced against all other public interests or representations in this matter that the Premises/Personal Licences Sub-Committee may wish to consider as appropriate, reasonable and proportionate in relation to the application that has been submitted and also the representation/s that has/have been received against it.

In making their decision as to whether to grant this application, Members of the Premises/Personal Licences Sub-Committee should also take into consideration Article 1 of the First Protocol of the Human Rights Act 1998, that individuals are entitled to the peaceful enjoyment of their property, and also Article 8 that everyone has the right to respect for his private and family life and his correspondence.

Crime and Disorder Implications

Section 17 of the Crime and Disorder Act 1998 imposes a duty on local authorities when exercising any of their functions to have due regard to the likely effect of the exercise of those functions on, and the need to do all it possibly can to prevent, crime and disorder in its area.

Members are requested to consider the information shown below where the Licensing Authority has received a representation about an application which is relevant to one or more of the four licensing objectives, and which suggests that the application may have a negative impact on one or more of the licensing objectives.

4.0 STEPS THAT APPLICANTS PROPOSE TO TAKE TO PROMOTE THE LICENSING OBJECTIVES WITHIN THEIR OPERATING SCHEDULE

The applicant has stated the following steps in the application to promote the licensing objectives. These measures are reproduced as shown in the application form and are detailed below in italics for ease of reference. These are:

4.1 Crime and Disorder

Customers that appear to be affected by alcohol or other substance will be asked to leave the premises. Regular comments will be made requiring customers to leave the premises in an orderly manner.

4.2 Public Safety

Fire exits will be clearly marked and unobstructed. Regular checks will be made to ensure fire doors are closed and exits unobstructed.

4.3 Prevention of Public Nuisance

The premises will always be conducted in an orderly fashion and disorderly customers will be asked to leave the premises and not re-admitted. Announcements will be made for customers to respect neighbours whilst on the premises and leaving the premises.

4.4 Protection of Children from Harm

Children will not be permitted into the premises unless accompanied by a responsible adult and they will not be permitted in the area for gaming machines. No alcohol will be served to under 18's and photo ID will be required.

4.5 General Information in support of the application in relation to all of the licensing objectives.

Licensing objectives will be promoted by the actions taken above. Management of the club is operated in a manner consistent with the promotion of the four licensing objectives.

5.0 RELEVANT REPRESENTATIONS

5.1 Interested Parties/Other Persons

5.2 *The Police Reform and Social Responsibility Act 2011 (PRSR Act 2011) removed from the Licensing Act 2003 the specific reference for representations to be made by 'interested parties' and also removed the requirement that representations could only be accepted from persons living in the 'vicinity' of the premises concerned, or who had for example, a business in the 'vicinity' of the premises.*

5.3 *There was no guidance or definition of 'vicinity' within the Licensing Act 2003 which effectively had a limiting effect on those that could make relevant representations.*

5.4 *The PRSR Act 2011 replaced the references to 'interested parties' and 'vicinity' and substituted that representations can be made and accepted by the Licensing Authority from 'other persons' which means that those persons do not necessarily have to live or run a business for example in the proximity of the premises to be able to submit a valid and relevant representation.*

5.5 *The relevant extracts from the Section 182 Guidance that accompanies the Licensing Act 2003 advises the following in relation to 'other persons'. They are shown in italics for ease of reference.*

8.12 As well as responsible authorities, any other person can play a role in a number of

licensing processes under the 2003 Act. This includes any individual, body or business entitled to make representations to licensing authorities in relation to applications for the grant, variation, minor variation or review of premises licences and club premises certificates, regardless of their geographic proximity to the premises.

- 5.6 Representations can be made either against or in support of an application. The relevant extracts from the Section 182 Guidance that accompanies the Licensing Act 2003 advises the following in relation to this point.

9.3 Relevant representations can be made in opposition to, or in support of, an application and can be made by any individual, body or business that has grounds to do so.

- 5.7 A petition submitted by Holland Football Club showing 320 residents in support of the application and 17 individual letters of support have been received from residents in relation to this application.

- 5.8 147 letters of representations/objections have been received from residents in relation to this application.

6.0 **RESPONSIBLE AUTHORITIES**

No representations have been received from any other Responsible Authorities.

7.0 **POLICY CONSIDERATIONS**

The Licensing Authority's Statement of Licensing Policy expects applicants to demonstrate in their operating schedule that suitable and sufficient measures have been identified and will be implemented and maintained to prevent public nuisance relevant to the individual style and characteristics of their premises.

- 7.1 The relevant extracts from the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy in respect of Planning considerations (shown in italics) and also the 'Prevention of Public Nuisance' licensing objective are as follows:

- 1.20 *When the Licensing Authority is considering any application, it will avoid duplication with other regulatory regimes, so far as possible, and does not intend to use the licensing regime to achieve outcomes that can be achieved by other legislation. In particular, its licensing functions will be discharged separately from the Authority's functions as the local planning authority. **However, applications for premises licences for permanent commercial premises should normally be from businesses with planning consent for the property concerned.** (Other permissions may be applicable to licensed premises and applicants are expected to ensure that such permissions are obtained where necessary.)*

5.0 PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

- 5.1 Licensed premises have a significant potential to impact adversely on communities through public nuisances that arise from their operation. The Licensing Authority wishes to maintain and protect the amenity of residents and other businesses from the consequence of the operation of licensed premises whilst recognising the valuable cultural, social and business importance that such premises provide.
- 5.2 The Licensing Authority intends to interpret “public nuisance” in its widest sense, and takes it to include such issues as noise, light, odour, litter and anti-social behaviour, where these matters impact on those living, working or otherwise engaged in normal activity in an area.
- 5.3 Applicants need to be clear that the Licensing Authority will normally apply stricter conditions, including controls on licensing hours, where licensed premises are in residential areas and where relevant representations have been received. Conversely, premises for which it can be demonstrated have effective measures planned to prevent public nuisance, may be suitable for 24-hour opening.
- 5.4 In the case of shops, stores and supermarkets selling alcohol, the Licensing Authority will normally permit the hours during which alcohol is sold to match the normal trading hours during which other sales take place, unless there are exceptional reasons relating to disturbance or disorder.
- 5.5 Applicants will be expected to demonstrate in their operating schedule that suitable and sufficient measures have been identified and will be implemented and maintained to prevent public nuisance, relevant to the individual style and characteristics of their premises and events.

8.0 RELEVANT SECTION 182 GUIDANCE – PREVENTION OF PUBLIC NUISANCE

- 8.1 The following sections shown below in italics are taken from the Home Office Section 182 Guidance that accompanies the Licensing Act 2003 and are included for the assistance of the Licensing Sub Committee, the applicant, responsible authorities, residents and any other interested parties to this hearing. They do not however form the totality of the guidance in relation to this licensing objective which should also be considered in its entirety. These are:
- 2.18 *The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.*
- 2.19 *Public nuisance is given a statutory meaning in many pieces of legislation. It is however not narrowly defined in the 2003 Act and retains its broad common law meaning. It is important to remember that the prevention of public nuisance could therefore include low-level nuisance, perhaps affecting a few people living locally, as well as major disturbance affecting the whole community. It may also include in appropriate circumstances the reduction of the living and working amenity and environment of other persons living and working in the area of the licensed premises. Public nuisance may also arise as a result of the adverse effects of artificial light, dust, odour and insects or where its effect is prejudicial to health.*

9.0 RELEVANT SECTION 182 GUIDANCE- PREVENTION OF CRIME AND DISORDER

9.1 The following section shown below in italics is taken from the Home Office Section 182 Guidance that accompanies the Licensing Act 2003 and is included for the assistance of the Licensing Sub Committee, the applicant, responsible authorities, residents and any other interested parties to this hearing. They do not however form the totality of the guidance in relation to this licensing objective which should also be considered in its entirety. This is:

2.1 *Licensing Authorities should look to the police as the main source of advice on crime and disorder.*

10.0 RELEVANT SECTION 182 GUIDANCE –PLANNING AND BUILDING CONTROL

10.1 The following section shown below in italics is taken from the Home Office Section 182 Guidance that accompanies the Licensing Act 2003 and is included for the assistance of the Licensing Sub Committee, the applicant, responsible authorities, residents and any other interested parties to this hearing.

13.56 The statement of licensing policy should indicate that planning permission, building control approval and licensing regimes will be properly separated to avoid duplication and inefficiency. The planning and licensing regimes involve consideration of different (albeit related) matters. Licensing committees are not bound by decisions made by a planning committee, and vice versa.

13.57 There are circumstances when as a condition of planning permission, a terminal hour has been set for the use of premises for commercial purposes. Where these hours are different to the licensing hours, the applicant must observe the earlier closing time. Premises operating in breach of their planning permission would be liable to prosecution under planning law.

12.2 The Licensing Sub Committee is therefore asked to determine this application taking into consideration the application in its own right and on its own merits and also all of the relevant information that has been submitted as part of this report and at the hearing itself.



Noise and Nuisance Action Plan

1. All members of staff will be aware of procedures to reduce noise and nuisance.
2. All outside music speakers will be played on the west side, having the clubhouse behind to reduce the sound from the closest residence. (nearest 120metres)
3. A close boarded fence will be placed on the end of the east of side of clubhouse. Also on the west side across the rear of all residential premises. Which are some 120metres away.
4. All amplified music will have a limiter that will bring the output down to the appropriate levels agreed with local authority. Also a music noise indicator will be fitted. All speakers will be placed on rubbing matting to reduce transmission.
5. All music bass will be reduced to reduce noise.
6. All ducting within the clubhouse will be turned off to reduce sound transmission.
7. A member of staff will do routine perimeter surveillance to access noise levels and reduce if required.
8. A member of staff will assist the patrons leaving the premises at night to reduce noise levels.
9. The exit road is fully tarmaced to reduce car tyre noise.
10. Calming and controlled music will be played 30 minutes before closing time to reduce the number of patrons leaving at the same time.
11. Notices will be placed on all exits asking patrons to leave quietly and respect all surrounding neighbours.
12. Local agreement with all taxi companies will be arranged for them to enter the premises to collect their customers. This is to save on outside noise levels. Also car horns will not be allowed.

13. The clubhouse does not have any windows that can be opened on the east side of the building. All the windows are double glazed and the exit door is on the west side. Some 120 metres away from properties.

It has/is developing this ground (leased from TDC) using a number of grants (s106, Big Society and ECC's Community Initiative Fund etc.).
Whilst this has been going on it has for a year or so used Clacton FC's ground and facilities to play its senior men's matches in the Eastern Counties League and Cup. The Club is embedded in the community has many playing members young and old, girls and boys, women and men – a significant number being Holland on Sea and East Clacton residents

My first contact with the Club was when the Club Chair, Mark (copied in) telephoned me and asked to meet and discuss giving my 'ECC Councillor' support to the club's CIF bid. We met, and I went along with my friend Ray Smith to watch an away game at Wivenhoe and a number of home games. At half times, Mark made Ray and myself a cup of tea. I consider myself to a fan/supporter as I pay the normal admission fee at the turnstile.

I ran out of characters and keep getting timed out of your "online comments section", so will write with an amount of brevity, albeit with a strength of feeling and conviction.

I would state, our reasons for objection:-

The applicant seems to have applied more for a nightclub license without regard to the surrounding neighbourhood or its residents.

Property will be devalued.

Property will be damaged.

Litter will be thrown/dropped around the roads and into residents gardens, at best.

Unsociable behaviour will ensue, and I fear for the safety of any resident and their property that may wish to challenge such people.

Loud arguments and fighting will break out due to the nature of people and alcohol.

The times of the license will allow alcohol and music inside, and unbelievably outside, into very unsociable hours - every night!. This in addition to the "light pollution" that residents will have to endure – Incidentally, I notice that the number of Floodlights is increasing from 4 to 6.

Late night drinkers and revellers will be drawn to this "nightspot" after their usual club/pub/bar has closed, because this will be the only "club/bar" open at that time of night or early hours of the morning.

Social events and other "Private" events will draw more vehicles than the 85 space car park will allow, thereby forcing others to park in nearby residential streets, which will not be able to handle the excess vehicles. Residents will not be able to gain access to their properties as the roads were not built to take such amount of traffic.

We would happily support the football club, but it sounds more like an application for a "nightclub" where the owners can make a profit at the expense (both financially and wellbeing) of the local residents.

It would be an outrage to allow such a license to be approved in the centre of an otherwise purely residential area, where generally people are in retirement status.

I therefore join my fellow neighbours in vehemently objecting to this license application.

Gainsford Gardens, and the immediate neighbourhood, is favoured by elderly/ retired people who enjoy the quiet and safety it affords.


Indeed, the developers of Gainsford Gardens describe their development as being *"designed to meet the tastes, interests and aspirations of those aged 55 and over"*.



History of old club House since 2007

The TDC councillors for Holland on Sea have for approximately ten years received a catalogue of complaints about the Holland FC **old** club house bar and music activity in a residential area. A petition was gathered and a meeting took place on the field between local residents and ex licensing officer Mr Toomey. Despite protests from residents at the meeting a licence for music and alcohol was granted. It was however, on the assurance that the club would be monitored by the council, this did not happen.

Can you imagine the reaction of the residents now who have just heard that a new application has been put forward for new licensing hours as follows:-

Monday to Thursday	10 am to 12 am	14 hours
Friday to Saturday	11 am to 2 am	15 hours
Sunday	10 am to 1 am	13 hours

We therefore object on behalf of local residents for the following reasons:-

1 **Negative impact on home owners in** Lyndhurt Rd, Dulwich Rd, Hazelemere Rd, Madeira Rd and Gainsford Avenue, and the wider community. These Residents are mainly retired, elderly, frail, sick and house bound, these people chose **not** to buy a home in the vicinity of a bar and dance Venue. For this council, who own this new clubhouse to once again, approve this licence application would conflict with the Council's motto ***for the good of all.***

2 Parking and traffic issues

All sea front side roads have parking restrictions because the roads are very narrow. The policing of these roads should be done by Colchester Parking Services who despite repeated requests, don't do the job. We have asked the club management to request that their members and visitors use the large FREE car park at Hazelmere Rd a five minute walk away, but they ignore the request. If this larger club house is issued with

these licences the traffic issues will be absolutely intolerable.

The long suffering residents respectively request that their objections are upheld.

The clubhouse was built with a 106 money agreement attached to the new clubhouse as part of the planning application for 54 bungalows in Gainsford Avenue. The prospective new owners it appears are unaware that they will have a noisy clubhouse in their back yard. The properties are now being marketed by Blake & Thickbroom Estate Agents. These agents are the same company who provided a reference to the Holland FC big society funding applicant Mark Sorrell. Mark Sorrell has been awarded funding of £17k, from the TDC big society fund, £20k from ECC, CIF and £93k from the Football Association (£130k in all). Blake & Thickbroom are aware that, if Holland FC go up to a higher league, disturbances in this area will increase due to the need for more memberships.

Blake and Thickbroom the company marketing the 54 bungalows in Gainsford Avenue (attached to the planning application and 106 agreement) are allegedly not mentioning to prospective buyers that there will be a clubhouse that will be used as a social venue next door to the homes.

In Summary

We appreciate that there is nothing the licensing committee can do about the football activity, but you can restore residents' confidence in local democracy and refuse these licensing applications.


I am quite appalled to hear a local, nearby club has applied for a 2am late night music licence!

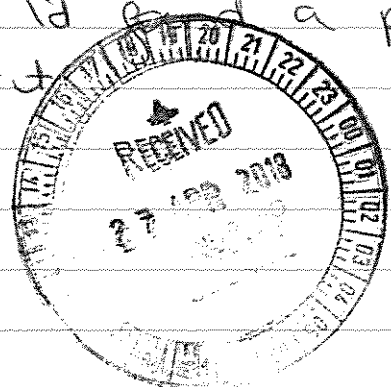

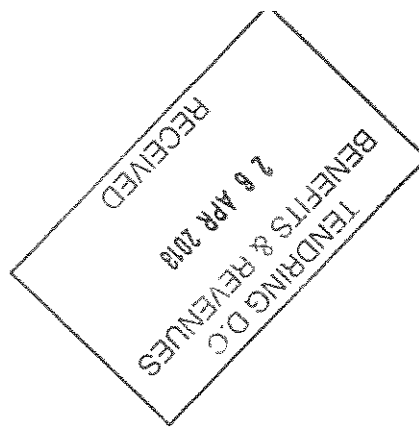

We object to the above application on the following grounds:

The club house, being surrounded by a heavily developed residential area, is unsuitable for what would in effect be a drinking club/disco. The sound of music travels long distances at night and would be a very considerable disturbance, particularly after 11pm, for residents and their children living in a quiet neighbourhood such as Holland-on-Sea. As you will be aware from the number of complaints regarding loud night-time music received by councils, noise pollution is a national grievance. Those given the task of deciding what is acceptable should consider the level they themselves and their families could comfortably live with during the small hours on a regular basis.

Another national grievance is the noise made by revellers when leaving a drinking establishment – shouted farewells, the slamming of car doors and revving engines. There is no reason to believe that those attending events at Holland Football Club would behave differently, particularly after long drinking periods up to 2am. when most people living in the area would be in bed.

The licences, if approved, would also have the effect of increasing the number of vehicles using local residential roads, again a potential unwelcome noise source.

And then there is the question of homes being devalued by the introduction of such an out of character activity to the area. Members of planning committees are expected to maintain the character of an area when deciding applications, the same criteria should apply to applications such as alcohol and music licences.

And it should also be borne in mind that if this application is successful the beneficiaries, financial or otherwise, will not be the residents living in the surrounding area.

Hi Michael

Thank you for supplying the additional information in relation to the premises licence application submitted by Holland FC (Ref: 18/00213/PREMGR).

Having had the opportunity to review the operating schedule submitted by the applicant I wish to submit a representation. I am concerned by the lack of detail provided and that advice to applicants offered in Tendring District Council's Statement of Licensing Policy appears to have been disregarded. There does not appear to be appropriate evidence submitted by the applicant regarding control measures that will be in effect based upon risk assessments they have undertaken to promote the licensing objectives or consideration for any additional measures that may be required for events or Temporary Event Notices.

The applicant has also asked for all licensable activities to occur indoors and outdoors but there is no clarification of the boundaries of any outside areas to give context to the potential impact on local residents and the licensing objectives.

In relation to the licensing objectives my concerns are mainly that whilst some control measures have been proposed the licensing objectives do not appear to have been fully considered and some appear aspirational. Without thorough risk assessments I fail to see how the premises can promote the licensing objectives to the best of their ability.

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The applicant has offered that drunk individuals' will be asked to leave the premises and announcements will be made requesting customers to leave in an orderly manner. There is no mention of staff training or whether staff other than the DPS will hold a personal licence, the adoption of best practice policies (such as Drugs and Pubs, Portman Group etc), the use of CCTV for crime prevention or evidential purposes, whether SIA licensed door supervisors will be used at peak times or for events, lighting for outside areas etc. Without proper control measures in place there is the risk of elevated crime levels and anti social behaviour at the premises.

Public Safety

The applicant has offered that fire exits will be clearly marked and will be checked to ensure they are unobstructed. There is no information about what risk assessments the applicant has undertaken in relation to public safety and whether consideration has been given for example to the use of plastic glasses to avoid cut feet or to prevent glass entering the clubs football pitches and nearby children's playground, staff numbers for events and the training they have undertaken, CCTV, etc. Fire exits are one

element of public safety and the applicant has not demonstrated that they have thought about the wider implications of the operation of their premises which puts the public at risk.

The Prevention of Public Nuisance

There is no reference to the applicant having considered the advice within the document “Licensed Premises: Public Nuisance Control, Environmental Health Guidance for Licensees” or Tendring District Council’s own Statement of Licensing Policy in that nuisance for licensed premises is taken in it’s widest sense and so needs to be addressed within the operating schedule. So whilst the applicant does acknowledge that customers will be asked to respect neighbours when leaving the premises there’s no input regarding management of music noise, proximity of residential properties, taxi’s collecting customers, smells from providing late night refreshment, litter, how any external smoking areas will be managed. The club premises certificate for Holland FC had a condition relating to the closure of external windows and doors after 22:00 so that regulated entertainment was not audible at the boundaries of surrounding residential properties. This could have been offered as a voluntary condition and viable control measure for the new premises.

The Protection of Children from Harm

Again similar to the other licensing objectives no reference is made to existing guidance documents such as the Safer Seafront guidance around CSE or the Football Association’s own safeguarding policies that may have adequate measures in place to promote this licensing objective. There is no reference to staff training, refusals logs, the use of challenge 25, what photo identification will be accepted, and how staff will address the issue of visiting teams and supporters and ensuring that children aren’t supplied alcohol or exposed to harmful behaviour. As mentioned above there is a children’s play area in close proximity to the premises which the applicant has failed to take into consideration. So whilst there are some control measures offered, and I appreciate an age verification policy is a mandatory condition, there is no further detail on how the applicant will meet this objective.

To summarise I recognise the importance of a diverse range of licensed premise but I believe the applicant has failed to adequately address how they will promote the four licensing objectives as they propose to change from a club premises certificate with modest hours to a premises licence with a significant increase in hours for licensable activities. As the application currently stands the hours requested for licensable activities and associated opening hours are not appropriate for a residential area.

Due to the nature of my work I would be grateful if my email address and home address were not published in any documents or reports relating to this application.



I live near to the new club house of Holland Football Club and have seen that an application for a Premises Licence is being made to allow music to be played and alcohol to be sold every day of the week and for exceedingly long and late hours.

This is something that I object to in the strongest possible terms. I feel that if this licence was to be granted, then I and the neighbourhood would suffer from noise, disturbance and anti-social behaviour because of the noise from events and customers arriving/leaving.



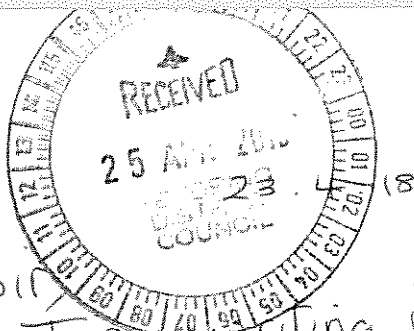

I am writing in relation to the alcohol and music license for Holland FC's new club house and to express our objection to the suggested opening hours.

We live on Third Avenue - opposite the entrance to the Eastcliff field. We have lived and settled here for four years and love the surrounding area, which is peaceful and feels safe to raise our three young children.

All our boys are football lovers and the biggest two both play for Holland FC football teams - we wholly support the development of the Holland FC, fully appreciate how wonderful the new stadium, pitch and clubhouse will be for the Club and welcome the benefits they will bring to our boys.

However, we are opposed to the opening hours suggested for the new clubhouse. Why does it have to be so late?? We believe that the previous club house used to have a license until midnight - however, this is not reassuring in the slightest as there is very little comparison between the two! The previous clubhouse was grotty and very uninviting. This new clubhouse will be brand new and appeal to the general public looking for a venue for a party. The most lucrative of parties being weddings and anyone with business sense, I would imagine, would steer in that direction. Therefore with a music, outdoor music and alcohol licence there would be nothing stopping the owner hosting weddings using a marquee on the pitch and having a live band in the marquee.

The obvious concern with the above scenario is that loud music and drunk people are going to be imposed in our neighbourhood - which was once very peaceful.

We live across the field and therefore not on top of the club house; this will, of course, affect us as we'll hear the music but I find it remarkable that this is even being considered due to the fact that people live so close to the club house! How can these hours for music and alcohol consumption even be considered when it will affect residents so greatly and of course affect their/our house price.

As I have said we are mostly hugely supportive of the development, however, we are extremely concerned about the ramifications of the club house opening hours and feel they are unreasonable and unnecessary. Why can they not be in line with the Rugby Club where opening hours in the week are until 11pm and midnight on Friday and Saturday's?? Why should us local residents be kept awake until 2am on a Saturday night?! The noise pollution of course, will not only be the music - once that is turned off everyone has to get home, walking and talking to cars, car doors slamming etc. Would you like to live near that and have your basic right of choosing when you're able to sleep be taken away?


When the new club House was first muted we were assured at meetings ,to get us onside ,that it's sole intention was to get youngsters involved with sport.

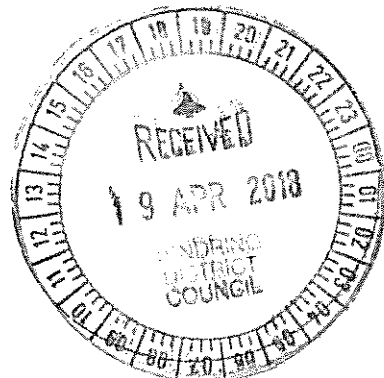

My husband and I write to strongly object to the very stressful knowledge that the Holland Football Club have applied for an alcohol license every day until very late on every night!

We moved to this idyllic new development for peace and quiet. We are too old to deal with stress, anger, disbelief that such an application has been put forward!

After living in our previous home for 45 years, only a mile away, we feel very strongly indeed about the plans even being put forward! We knew that the former football clubhouse building, which was part of an agreement when initial Gainsford Gardens plans were being put through, was agreed to be rebuilt by Scott Residential and this was known some two/ three years ago - to demolish the derelict clubhouse and rebuild it to be something which will be a great asset to the footballers and their families, but why the HFC wants licensing hours longer than pubs, the local rugby club, the Clacton Golf Club etc etc I cannot, like everyone on this development, get our heads around.

This development of 65 brand new bungalows changes the whole dynamics of the neighbourhood.

The area has changed beyond belief and the former old club house didn't have 65 new bungalows, housing approximately 120 residents, who would be

affected by such a license, plus dozens of other residents who live around and near the football club.

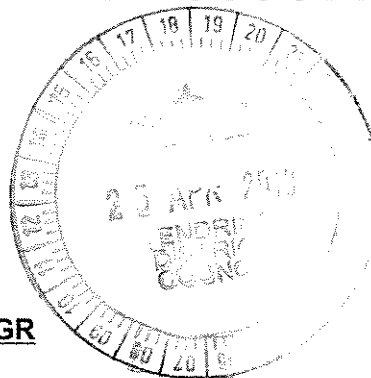

I write on behalf of the Holland-on-Sea Residents' Association to register the Association's objection to the above application submitted by Holland Football Club, Dulwich Road, Holland-on-Sea. It is my understanding that the club currently has a liquor licence valid for the hours 11am-12 midnight every day of the week, and is seeking to extend these hours in both the morning and evening every day of the week. There does however appear to be some confusion about the evening hours, as those published on your website do not agree with those on the written application I have seen. No matter which are correct the objection remains the same.

The football club is situated right on the edge of a densely populated residential area. The only access to the club car park is in Dulwich Road. Therefore, all vehicular traffic would necessarily have to use Dulwich Road and other side roads in the vicinity to gain entry to, and egress from the car park and club. To subject residents to the potential early morning disturbance this would cause seven nights a week (slamming car doors, revving engines etc) is unacceptable.

The club is, as the name implies, a football club, and liquor and music should be ancillary. It should not therefore be treated as a public house/members club. There are several such establishments within half a mile, so there can be no justification for an additional premise of this type in the area.

Part of the application is for the playing of live/recorded music on the premises. To allow this to occur for the duration of the hours requested would inflict additional disturbance on the nearby households and would be totally unfair to them. Any such entertainment should be strictly controlled to ensure noise levels are kept to a minimum and should terminate no later than 11pm on weekdays and Sundays, and midnight Friday & Saturday. It is recognised that during the course of the year the club will hold special events such as award presentations. Additional hours of entertainment could be granted for such special events upon application by the club. These applications should not exceed 4-6 per year.

It must be remembered that the Club benefited from its new premises as a result of the present development of residential properties off Gainsford Avenue and it would seem very inappropriate to then expect the new owners to have to accept the above antisocial actions.

The Holland-on-Sea Residents' Association is very keen to work with the football club to ensure that it has success both on and off the pitch, and continues to provide a valuable facility for positive diversionary activities for young people, but it must be ensured that this is done responsibly. To allow the application as it stands would, in the Association's view, cause untold misery to people living in the vicinity and that is why the Holland on Sea Residents' Association opposes it.

I am writing to register our strong objections to the Licensing hours application submitted by Holland Football Club, including the Club's intended 'Noise and Nuisance Plan' that is connected with this application.

We moved to the area last year having had connections here for many years and the quite nature of this end of Clacton led us to purchase a new bungalow on the Gainsford Gardens development.

Now, we understand that there was a football Club based nearby and that minimal noise from football activities would be heard however the proposed extensive social/business use of the new Club House was never expected and appalls us.

We were happy that the purchase of our property contributed in some way to building a new Club House and improving the football facilities for the local community but would never have thought that someone would attempt to ruin the peace of the local residential area by even attempting to get these extended licensing hours approved on a site so close to housing.

The proposed hours are quite frankly comical, these would be more consistent with a Night Club although the applicant seems to think that people will accept his word for it that it won't be anything like one, sorry but we're not convinced having read the available information including that from the applicant.

Regardless of what the applicant chooses to call his new venture, the noise heard from our properties and the disruption to local streets will be immense and run into the early hours most days.

The argument that Holland FC had a licence for 12 years prior is irrelevant in our opinion, we saw the old run down building (wooden shack) before it's demolition and this was hardly going to attract the numbers the new place would do, as a result there is no way the applicant can keep referring to or use the past history towards the licence of the new place.

In the submitted 'Noise and Nuisance plan' the applicant refers to 'Outside Music' with outdoor speakers !! Why ?

Surely if I as a homeowner were to play loud amplified music for hours in my garden I'd be causing a Statutory Noise Nuisance due to the impact on my neighbours ? How is this any different...

Regardless of sound levels and so called 'monitoring' by inexperienced staff this is a blatant disregard for local residents, outside music isn't necessary for pubs and clubs let alone a football social club and given the close proximity to residential areas and the late hours mentioned this needs to be refused point blank.

Noise travels, fact, a 'close boarded fence' and '120 metres' to the nearest houses is irrelevant and a very weak argument, expensive technical solutions such as sound deadening barriers needs to be considered with professional surveys done prior to even considering this side of the application, I'm afraid 'my mate will put up a bit of close board fencing in a few places' to deaden the sound shows the amateur approach we've witnessed throughout this whole application.

'The exit road is fully tarmaced to reduce car tyre noise' ... what about the rest of the huge car park which I believe is loose stone shingle? Cars will need to travel a distance over shingle to get to this 'exit road', taxis too will be using the shingle car park late at night to pick up and create a huge noise nuisance so yet again the reference to a quite exit road is fairly pointless.

Late at night the applicant refers to 'Calming and controlled music' being played for the last 30 minutes, this implies that the previous evenings entertainment will neither be calm or controlled ??

As we all know this will have little or no affect when alcohol is added to the equation which brings me to mention the poor member of staff 'assisting' patrons leaving the building to keep noise levels down, I'm assuming that these members of staff will have little training on how to handle intoxicated members of the public and zero enforcement powers. Certainly not a job I'd relish, telling some 20 stone guy to keep the noise down when he's half cut, again it's a ridiculous suggestion.

Lets be honest, Mr Sorrell runs various business ventures in the local area and I'm sure that his priority along with many non-league club Chairman across the country is to make money out of this, whether that's for the Club or not I fear that we as local residents will suffer if the proposed Licence and the associated music and noise it will create is allowed.

A point to bear in mind is that having only moved in last year the impact that this unreasonable application would have on our property price could be huge, is this fair and the way Tendring District Council welcomes new residents and Council Tax payers to the area ?

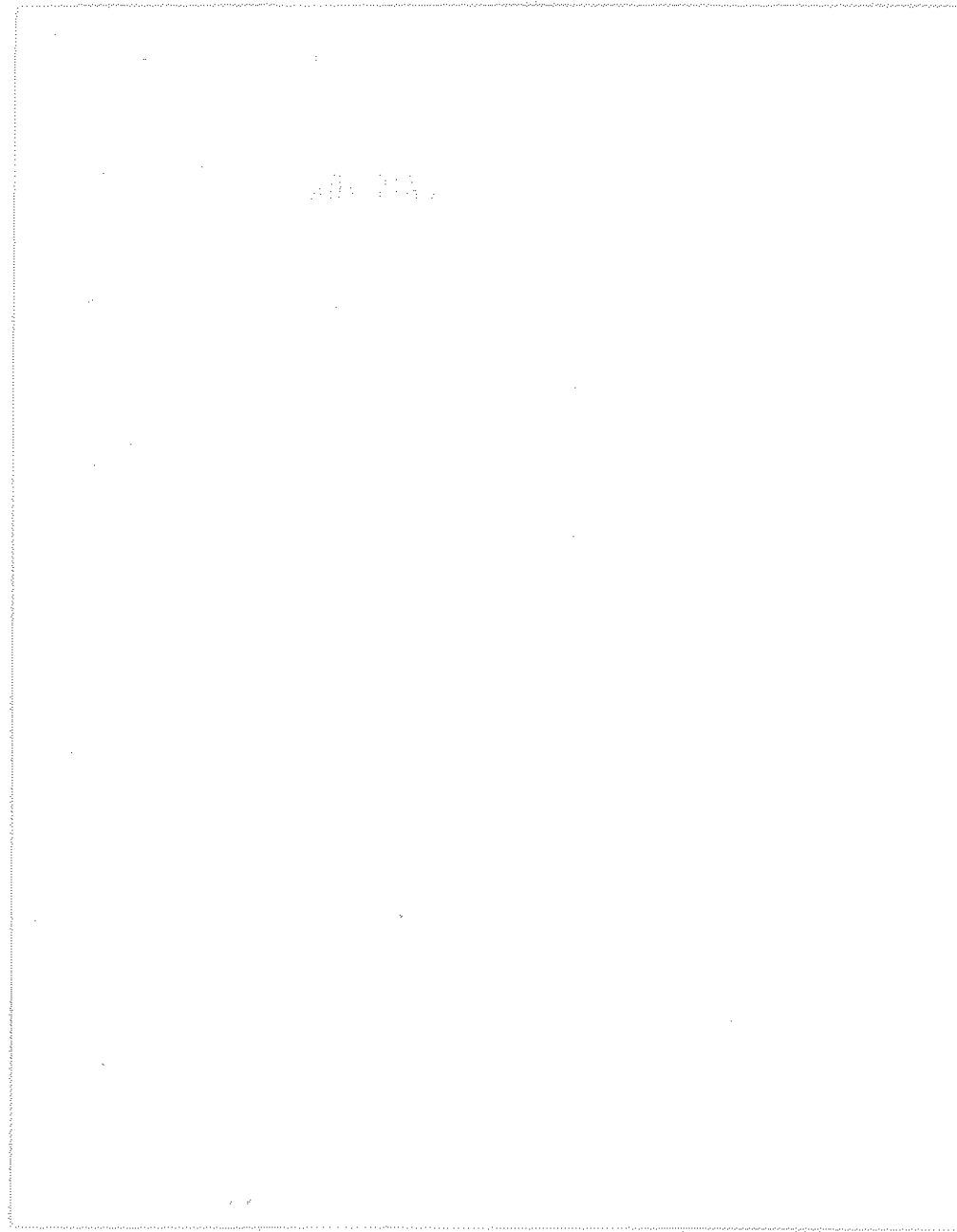

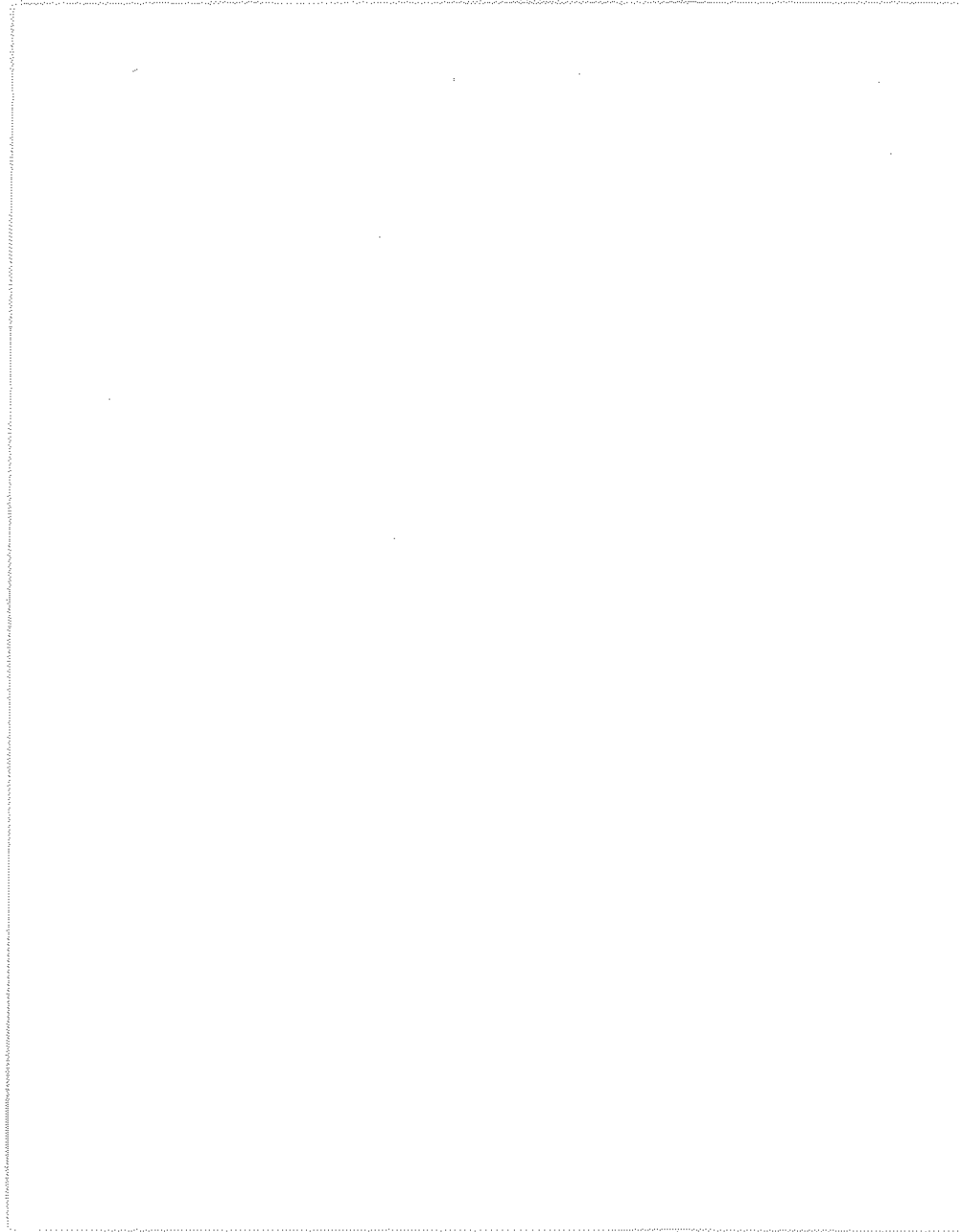

Dear Panel Member,
I understand Holland Football Club has recently submitted a Licencing Application for its new Clubhouse in Dulwich Road, please see below.
The late night closing times submitted are not conducive to having GOOD NEIGHBOURLY RELATIONS which any club in Holland on Sea should and must go out of its way to foster and encourage – particularly one that espouses being a 'community club'. It should be remembered that this new community resource which **considerable public money has helped create and establish** is indeed a Football Club and not a drinking establishment – which there are numerous within a quarter of a mile.

When looking at bench marks it should be noted that fellow local Football Club, Clacton FC, does not have homes as close, or as many, to its clubhouse in Rush Green - as Holland FC has in Dulwich Road and Seafields Road etc.

The Licencing provision should reflect the football season. I think that 11pm on Monday to Thursdays; 12 midnight on Fridays/Saturdays is more than adequate; and likewise 11pm on Sundays. (As opposed to the 12, 2am and 1am respectively on the application). Perhaps the Football Club could be permitted to *add an hour maximum* to each of these times for a maximum of one Friday, three Saturdays and one Sunday to support community football festivals etc; having first notified TDC and the immediate neighbours in advance of these respective dates for each calendar year.

I would expect all external doors to have been fitted with automatic closures to restrict noise escaping (and not to be wedged open at any time); and the windows along the flank wall facing the nearby houses been remained closed throughout. Likewise, the clubhouse should have a decibel limiter fitted to its music/entertainment facilities. Has this been checked as being in place?

Environmental Health colleagues will only be too aware of the local area already suffering from having to contain excessive noise from the caravan sites. Has there been a prohibition placed on all externally produced entertainment at this site? Signs should be permanently displayed by the exit doors reminding people departing to respect neighbours' peace and quiet.

Please think very deeply before making your considered decision. Please recognise the special demographics of the immediate area. It is extremely difficult to return the genie once the cork has been removed.

Local residents expect, value and are entitled to live in quiet, peaceful residential roads at all times.


These premises are in a quiet residential area. Mainly with young families or elderly residents. This would surely put the club house in the same category as the pubs and clubs.



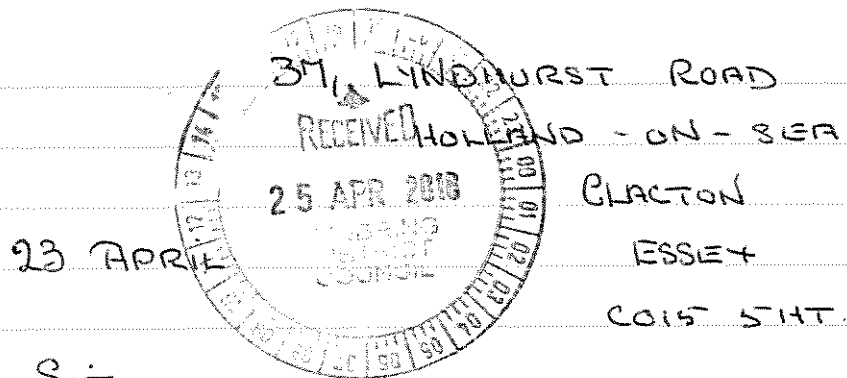

Procedure for hearings – Premises/Personal Licences Sub-Committee

Licensing Act 2003 and Hearing Regulations 2005

The Licensing Committee officers and their roles

- The Committee Clerk (Democratic Services Officer) records the proceedings;
- The Legal Advisor provides independent advice to the Committee Members on legal matters; and
- The Licensing Officer introduces the matter, outlines the application or review as set out in the Report, and answers any questions Members may have.

Committee Members (Councillors):

Members have a responsibility to declare interests, those who declare **Discloseable Pecuniary Interest (DPI)** as defined by The Relevant Authorities (DPI) Regulations 2012 must not take part in the hearing of the application.

If a Member declares a **Pecuniary or Non-Pecuniary Interests**, as defined by Tendring District Council's Members' Code of Conduct (paragraphs 5 and 6), they must consider the impact of that interest on participation and the public perception;

- **Matters for Members to consider would cover, but not exclusively:**
 - o they know the applicant or any of the objectors; or
 - o they wish either to support or oppose the granting or continuation of a licence either personally or on behalf of their constituents.
 - o whether they have expressed a view on the application site especially, if situated either in their ward or an adjacent ward;

Other Persons or Interested Parties:

This is the term given to an individual, body or business or a representative acting on their behalf-that raises an objection or make a representation to an application for a premises/personal licence. It should be noted that only the Police can make a representation against a Personal Licence application however. These other persons or interested parties are separate to Responsible Authorities, who may also be a party to the hearing.

PROCEDURE

THESE SUB-COMMITTEES MEETINGS & THE HEARING ARE HELD IN PUBLIC, UNLESS THERE IS A LEGAL REASON NOT TO DO SO, HOWEVER THESE ARE IN LIMITED CIRCUMSTANCES.

Note: if the Sub-committee does not have an elected Chairman already, the election of one Member as Chairman will be the first item of business.

Step	By whom	
1	Chairman	<p>The Chairman will welcome everyone to the meeting then:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. introduce themselves and the other 2 members and explain that the 4th member (substitute) will not take any part in the hearing or decision making process unless there is a valid objection to one of the other members sitting, if any interest declared debars a member or a member falls ill; b. announce the item to be considered; c. confirm that this procedure will be followed at the hearing, including any maximum periods of time for each side to put their case or objections (*); d. ask all parties, including any "Responsible Authority", to introduce themselves indicating whether or not they are represented, if they are calling any witnesses and if so to identify the witnesses they will be calling. Where there are a number of objectors they will be asked to confirm who their spokesperson is if it is relevant or appropriate for them to do so. e. if a party or Responsible Authority who has made relevant representations is not present, the Sub-Committee will decide whether they consider it in the public interest to (a) continue with the hearing or (b) defer it to enable the party or authority to attend. In reaching a decision on this point, the Sub-Committee will consider any information received from the party either directly or via the Licensing Officer or any other interested person/party where relevant or appropriate; f. remind all present that the Sub-Committee can only make its decision based on the four licensing objectives, namely: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (1) prevention of crime and disorder, (2) public safety, (3) prevention of public nuisance and (4) protection of children from harm.

2	Licensing Officer	Will introduce the application or review, highlighting areas of contention or dispute.
3	Committee members	May ask questions of the Licensing Officer.
<p>The Applicant's case</p> <p>(If a person or party requests a review of an existing licence, they would in effect be the Applicant for the review. In those circumstances they would present their case following the summary given by the Licensing Officer)</p>		
4	Applicant or their representative	Will present their case and call witnesses.
5	Responsible authorities or Interested Parties	Each, in turn, may ask questions of the Applicant by way of clarification.
6	Committee members	In turn, each may ask questions of the Applicant.
7	Applicant	May ask any further questions of any witnesses to clear up any points raised in the earlier questioning.

8	Responsible Authorities	Will make their representations to the Sub-Committee.
